Theory of Change

Overview

Africause operates with the mission to address the challenges facing African Australians by improving access to services, reducing social isolation, and fostering full participation in society. The theory of change revolves around the following key principles:

Key Principles of Africause

Plan of Impact

- Short Term (1-2 years): Increase access, raise awareness, and strengthen partnership.
- Medium Term (3-5 years): Improve employment rates, enhance youth resilience, promote inclusion.
- Long Term (5-10 years): Reduce systemic racism, build integrated services, and foster and inclusive society.



Identifying Common Barriers

Africause targets systemic challenges like racism, exclusion and low income which limit access to education, employment and essential services.



Empowering Youth and Communities

We build confidence in African-Australian youth and their communities by improving access to services and supporting their mental wellbeing.



Collaboration and Advocacy

Through our partnerships we create sustainable solutions and facilities to access vital resources like education, healthcare, legal support and employment.



Community Driven Solutions

Africause empowers communities to lead initiatives, connecting stakeholders to drive innovation and resilience.



Addressing Emerging Issues

We tackle challenges like unemployment, family violence, substance abuse and school dropouts by focusing on pathways for those in juvenile justice or living with disabilities.

Timeline of Africause

Foundation and Community Building (2013-2018)

From 2013 to 2018, Africause established a strong foundation focused on supporting African Australian youth and fostering community connections. Key partnerships with Victoria Police and local organizations helped reduce school dropout rates, address youth crime, and build trust between communities and law enforcement. Africause launched programs like Team Africa and expanded academic support through the Homework Club, empowering youth to engage in sports, education, and skilled professions. This period marked significant progress in creating pathways for youth development and social inclusion.

Timeline of Africause

Expansion and Empowerment (2019-2024)

From 2019 to 2024, Africause expanded its impact through targeted programs addressing education, employment, and social inclusion. Collaborations with institutions like the University of Melbourne and youth detention centres opened new pathways for mentorship, self-employment, and higher education. Africause also provided crucial pandemic support, including online academic help, food distribution, and mental health workshops to keep communities resilient. These years solidified Africause's role as a critical support network, driving long-term empowerment and positive change within African Australian communities.



Chairperson's Report



Overview

This year was another pivotal year for Africause full of successful strategic progress. Through targeted programs in education and justice, we have empowered African Australian communities and have seen transformative results. It is a credit to our tireless staff, volunteers, and partners for their contributions and support.

Our Goals

Our goals this year were ambitious and uniquely focused on seeing tangible results from our strategic plan developed during our strategic review of 2023. Our 3-5 Year Plan sets in motion the overall direction of Africause particularly in the areas of youth justice and education.



Education

- Board member Kel Magano-Niebling led the charge to go into schools and provide first-hand assistance to students in crisis, With Kel's support, Africause was able to provide support, training and more to connect with the children and improve the learning environment for both students and teachers.
- In partnership with Victoria University, our African Masters Teacher Program provides more teachers with African cultural awareness and proactively tackles the teacher shortage in Australia.
- The Africause Flemington Homework Club assists younger children in their studies and has seen an increase in popularity. Our Homework Club is at capacity and in need of volunteers to donate their time. to help the next generation succeed in school. We welcome all volunteers to donate their time and make an impact!



Youth Justice

- The Africause Restorative Justice Pilot Program aims to address the needs of refugees and migrants in Victoria through a restorative justice approach by providing a safe and supportive environment for victims and offenders to engage in dialogue, understand the impact of their actions, and develop resolutions. This program offers victims support and counselling while ensuring the offenders are rehabilitated and making amends. Lastly, the program encourages community mediation by facilitating dialogues between victims, offenders and community members to address harm caused by crime and develop solutions.
- As we failed to secure funding, we saw the end of the Victoria Police Diversity Recruitment Program which assisted members in our community to become PCO's and PSO's. Our impact within the program included:
 - 13 fifteen week courses run through Victoria University TAFE
 - 250 participants 29 still engaged and 105 successfully passed the exam
 - 60 new police officers within the Victoria Police Academy

The Ubuntu Program: A Holistic Approach to Education

The Ubuntu Program fosters collaboration between schools, families and students to overcome communication barriers by partnering with select schools. Schools often rely on Africause to mediate challenges, reflecting the programs strong impact.



Secondary School Teacher Training

In partnership with Victoria University, the Secondary School Teacher Training initiative aims to create a more inclusive school environment by empowering culturally connected educations.



Homework Club: 20+ Years of Academic Support

For over 20 years, Africause's Homework Club has provided academic support in English and Mathematics to over 35 students weekly at Flemington Community Centre, with remote support for Year 11 and 12 students.





Program Highlight

Africause and Victoria University Partnership

This partnership is aimed at increasing teacher diversity within Australian schools by recruiting pre-service teachers from African-Australian backgrounds and equipping them with a Master of Applied Teaching (Secondary Education) degree. This degree is a scholarship-supported, employment-based program through which Africause supports our teachers with scholarships for living expenses and university costs.

Work and Development Permit Scheme 2023-2024

Easing Financial Burdens

Africause supports individuals facing financial hardship through the Work and Development Permit (WDP) Scheme, which allows disadvantaged community members to convert their fines into non-financial options to address debts owed to Fines Victoria. Africause is licensed by Fines Victoria to sponsor those unable to pay their fines. With rising living costs, many are struggling to meet basic needs. The scheme requires participants to complete unpaid work hours based on the amount of their fines. This opportunity enables our community members to ease financial burdens, maintain employment, and support their families.

Restorative Justice

Overview

Africause's approach to Restorative Justice includes tackling broader socio-economic issues such as unemployment, school dropouts, and racial marginalisation. While our other programs tackle the root cause of criminal activity, our Restorative Justice initiative ensures young people have the resources they need to thrive while also providing an important advocacy piece for addressing systemic challenges to protect the community from gang-related violence and its far reaching consequences.

Objectives

- Empower families and communities to voice their concerns and seek proactive solutions.
- Create partnerships with law enforcement, social services, and local government.
- Provide early intervention by providing access to mental health resources, social programs, and rehabilitation for youth at risk.
- Reduce recidivism by supporting youth in overcoming challenges.

Partnerships



RMIT University

In partnership with the Centre for Innovative Justice at RMIT University and funded by the Victorian Legal Services Board, Africause launched the "Africause Community Restorative Justice" Initiative. This initiative was developed through extensive consultations with the community addressing inidividual needs while addressing opportunities in employment, education and training.



Victoria Police

In partnership with Victoria Police, over 200 African Australians joined the Victoria Police as staff or frontline officer aiming to build trust between law enforcement and African communities fostering a more inclusive and representative police force.

Program Highlight

Centre for Innovative Justice at RMIT University

In early 2024, the Centre for Innovative Justice (CIJ) collaborated with Africause to co-design the African Australian Circle of Support, a community-led justice model aimed at helping young African Australians avoid the criminal justice system. The model builds a circle of support around young people, leveraging community expertise and resources to provide mentorship, counseling, and accountability.

Highlights

Project Goal

Develop an alternative justice response for overrepresented communities by developing a strength-based support system involving peers, elders, families, and professionals.

Support Elements

Peer mentoring, counseling, community connections, and material assistance.

Funding

Victorian Legal Services Board funded the design; Africause seeks funding for a pilot program.

Outcome

Offers accountability and a positive pathway for young people.

Treasurer's Report



Introduction

I am pleased to present the Treasurer's Report for the year ending 30th of June 2024. This year has been crucial for Africause in advancing our mission to empower African Australian youth and families by providing access to education, employment, justice, and social inclusion. Through our partnerships with schools, employers, community groups, and government departments, we continue our mission to create a positive impact on the lives of African Australians in Victoria. Africause's total revenue for the year was \$495,655.02, primarily from grants and donations. Total expenses amounted to \$481,815.70, with the majority directed towards service and project delivery.

As at 30th of June 2024, Africause remains financially stable with assets of \$382,952.36 and liabilities of \$32,179.88. Careful financial management throughout the year has enabled us to maximise the impact of our resources while maintaining stability. However, with the growing demand for our programs, sustaining our efforts will require ongoing financial support.

I extend my deepest gratitude to our funders, partners, staff, volunteers, and board. Your contributions are vital in helping us continue to support African Australian youth and families, enabling them to thrive as part of a vibrant Australian society.




However, we recognise that there is still much work to be done. The challenges we face remain complex, but with continued focus and dedication, we are confident that we can make an even greater impact in the years to come.
